Letter from Director Wierzbicki

Dear OMEGA Members and Partners.

As yet another year passes, I continue to be impressed by the hardiness and resourcefulness of the OMEGA region. While 2020 was a year of challenges and adaptation, 2021 was a year of growth and perseverance. In March 2021, President Joseph Biden signed into law the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) which provided communities with financial aid to recover from hardships incurred as a result of the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic. The OMEGA region rose to the opportunity, demonstrating unrivaled ingenuity and fortitude in finding unique, meaningful uses for the ARPA funding. From infrastructure improvements and revenue recuperation to broadband expansion programs, ARPA funding in the OMEGA region is being allocated for projects that will lead to community and economic growth in the region. The funding allocation process will extend through 2024, giving communities ample time to make thoughtful, precise decisions.

Congress also passed the bipartisan infrastructure law, Building a Better America which promises to be of substantial benefit to our region. Outlined in the bill are three key areas of focus: transportation, climate/energy/environment, and broadband, which are all of vital importance across our region. We look forward to working alongside our communities on projects pertaining to these focus areas.

We are also excited to participate in the Recovery to Work Cohort Learning Academy, which strives to foster and curate partnerships between area businesses, recovery service providers and individuals in recovery from substance abuse disorders (SUD) who are ready to enter the workforce. The program is designed to coordinate Recovery to Work efforts on a regional scale while increasing the number of employers that hire, support, and retain individuals in recovery. The program is operating under the Development District Association of Appalachia (DDAA) through funding from the Appalachian Regional Commission (ARC) and also seeks to provide support services to program participants. During the coming year, we are hopeful that this initiative will increase labor participation rates and help to address the labor shortage that we are currently experiencing.

With Intel's plans to invest \$20 billion in Central Ohio, the largest private investment in state history, much of our region is well positioned to benefit through increased employment opportunities, new supply chain and other business opportunities, population growth, and new housing developments. We look forward to working with our members to make sure that we are prepared for this new development that will positively impact our region for years to come.

I would be remiss if I did not also mention the pride that I have for my staff and the entire organization. Like many businesses and entities across the nation, OMEGA experienced staffing changes in 2021. While we did have to say goodbye to two excellent employees, we also had the privilege and excitement of welcoming aboard three new employees: Evan Scurti joined the OMEGA team as a Senior Development Specialist; and Josh Sliker and Josey Rabare joined our transportation team. Although change is never an easy road, our strength as an organization is evident as we navigate these staffing changes. I am so grateful for the hard work, resourcefulness, and dedication of our staff as we strive to provide quality services to our members, and partners. By working together, we will strengthen our communities and economy by providing the pathways to build our businesses, workforce, infrastructure, culture, tourism, community leaders, and capacity.

OMEGA's main objective is to foster a cooperative effort in planning, development and implementation of local and regional plans, programs and projects which will increase the economic activity in the area and improve the quality of life for its citizens. OMEGA is also the Regional Transportation Planning Organization (RTPO) for Carroll, Columbiana, Coshocton, Guernsey, Harrison, Holmes, Muskingum and Tuscarawas counties.

2021 Meeting Highlights

As the COVID-19 pandemic continued into 2021, OMEGA hosted its February, March, and May meetings via Zoom Video Conference. However as the year progressed, COVID-19 cases decreased and in-person meetings were able to be held safely.











The Resilience Initiative for Southeastern and Eastern Ohio (RISE Ohio)

Spearheaded by a \$2.2 million grant from the U.S. Economic Development Administration (EDA) in January 2021, RISE Ohio is a bold initiative and unique partnership among OMEGA, Buckeye Hills Regional Council, and Ohio University's Voinovich School of Leadership and Public Service. The program is designed to yield quality job creation and economic diversification within an 18-county area (OMEGA and Buckeye Hills' regions) that is striving to move beyond an over-reliance on coal-related industries. EDA's investment was matched with \$250,000 from JobsOhio and \$300,000 from the Voinovich School's Appalachian New Economy Partnership (ANEP) State appropriation to create a \$2.75 million program that will offer a variety of services through the Local Development Districts and the Voinovich School.

RISE Ohio partners are tasked with engaging in several key strategies, including an analysis of the coal supply chain's ability to diversify into new markets; optimizing development within the 26 Opportunity Zones throughout the 18 counties; and a focused effort on economic recovery in Coshocton County in the wake of the 2019 closure of the Conesville power plant. OMEGA was specifically charged with retaining the Coshocton County Economic Recovery Coordinator as well as collaborating with Buckeye Hills on a plan to catalyze development in opportunity zones by offering technical assistance to our local partners as they strive to encourage investment in their respective Zones. Evan Scurti was hired on August 16, 2021 as OMEGA's Senior Development Specialist to oversee our RISE Ohio work program.

OMEGA procured the Hamman Consulting Group in July to serve as Coshocton County's Economic Recovery Coordinator. Principal/Owner Jason Hamman brings an impressive track record of local development success, specifically in communities rebounding from the loss of a major employer. Beginning with a September 9th kick-off meeting attended by over 30 local leaders from throughout Coshocton County, Jason is offering a unique perspective to the Coshocton Port Authority and its various stakeholders. A critical component of Jason's work is his assistance to local governments, as they analyze utility expansion strategies to support growth plans. Jason will provide detailed industrial development recommendations in 2022 along with an analysis of the local tourism economy's ability to attract more investment.

The Resilience Initiative for Southeastern and Eastern Ohio (RISE Ohio)



To support development in the region's Opportunity Zones, OMEGA partnered with Buckeye Hills on the September procurement of the consulting team of Steadfast City and Strategic Advisory and Investment Services. The team's scope of work focuses on providing legal and technical assistance in regard to this new federal income tax incentive program. The Federal Tax Cuts and Jobs Act of 2017 created 8,764 zones in low-to-moderate census tracts around the country (320 in Ohio), and OMEGA is focused on ensuring that our staff and local leaders understand how to deploy these new tax benefits into our region's 14 Opportunity Zones. Since September the consulting team has engaged each local economic development office, meeting with 23 local leaders from the OMEGA region to explain the Opportunity Zone program. They also presented their consulting plan at OMEGA's December board meeting as well as at the November 5th Eastern Ohio Development Alliance (EODA) meeting to a combined audience of 113 attendees. The consultants' findings will help them design a 2022 series of workshops, with topics aligned with the unique development needs of the OMEGA and Buckeye Hills Opportunity Zones. Finally, in late 2021 OMEGA presented a framework for a Regional Opportunity Zone Prospectus to the consulting team. As the consulting project progresses into 2022, each of the 14 Zones will be profiled within the prospectus, with a publication goal of 3rd Quarter 2022. Steadfast City and Strategic Advisory and Investment Services are gaining great traction, and our staff fully expects to engage with local leaders on 3-5 substantive Opportunity Zone development projects in 2022, ranging from industrial park expansion to downtown redevelopment.

OMEGA looks forward to continuing these great RISE partnerships throughout 2022. We are confident that exciting new development and quality job creation will serve as a great return on investment for the generous grants that made the program possible.




<u>Tri-County Active Transportation Plan for</u> <u>Coshocton, Holmes,</u> and Tuscarawas Counties

In 2021, OMEGA re-launched and completed the Tri-County Active Transportation Plan for Coshocton, Holmes, and Tuscarawas Counties. The purpose of this plan is to improve the safety and reliability of walking, bicycling, and buggy infrastructure and educational resources for Coshocton, Holmes, and Tuscarawas Counties. This plan is the result of a collaborative effort with OMEGA, ODOT, tri-county area local officials, community members, and other stakeholders. The vision is to develop a safe, connected multimodal system for people of all ages and abilities. Recommendations and implementation strategies were developed to achieve this vision and to meet the established goals. The Tri-County region will be able to use this plan as the basis to procure funding for recommended non-infrastructure and infrastructure improvements.





Regional Roadway Safety Plan



In August 2020, OMEGA kicked off the Regional Roadway Safety Plan. Feedback from our stakeholders was crucial to the success of this plan, as no one knows the local roads better than the people that drive them regularly. Using a multidisciplinary approach, we developed a robust list of safety concerns and relevant, cost-effective countermeasures to mitigate those concerns. Throughout this process, our planning team worked with individual counties to determine the needs and concerns of each of their local areas, and then developed a regionwide approach to tackle potential safety issues. As part of this plan, the consultant team created a new tool to analyze crashes on a regional level. This plan, completed in June 2021, will be instrumental in pursuing federal, state, and other funding sources to implement the proposed countermeasures. RTPO Executive Update

RTPO Allocation Program

In 2021, House Bill 74 of the 134th Ohio General Assembly allocated \$5.2 million in funding over the state's biennium for the creation of a Regional Transportation Planning Grant Program. Since being officially designated as a Regional Transportation Planning Organization in 2016, this is the first time that the OMEGA RTPO region will receive an allocation from the federal Surface Transportation Block Grant (STBG) program. Each Ohio RTPO was allocated funding dependent on a base allocation of \$100,000 and a formula-based calculation based on land area and population. Based on these calculations, OMEGA is allocated **\$572,321** annually in state fiscal year (SFY) 2022 and SFY 2023.OMEGA's Executive Board adopted the **OMEGA RTPO Allocation Policy** in December 2021 and OMEGA will accept applications to this new program in 2022.



SPECIAL GRANT FUNDING:

In CY 2020, ODOT awarded OMEGA \$100,000 in special grant funding to support regional coordinated goals through the development and funding of regional projects. Four projects were selected by the Steering Committee, supported by the RCC, and approved by OMEGA's Executive Board. The four special projects were all initiated, implemented, and completed in CY 2021, and are listed below.

The **Region 9 Resource Guide** is an interactive online resource guide for all OMEGA Region 9 counties listing comprehensive information about all transportation options, HHS services, and counseling by county. The web address for the Guide is www.region9resourceguide.com. The Region 9 Resource Guide became available to the public on October 12, 2021. To date it has increased in site visits by about one hundred additional views each month with 222 views reported for the mid- December to mid-January month alone.



Regional Coordinated Transportation Pilot Program



The **Employment Transportation Feasibility Study**, conducted by SIXMO Consulting, developed four potential employment transportation routes to service Coshocton County and eventually expand to include Muskingum, Tuscarawas, and Holmes counties. The One Call/One Click Regional Call Center Strategic Planning Study, conducted by KFH Consulting, developed a regionally responsive and accepted model for the Mobility Solutions Center (regional call center). The **Media Outreach Campaign** featured both local and regional media projects. OMEGA Region 9 counties utilized print media (newspapers and billboards) and social media formats. For the regional level campaign, two Public Service Announcement (PSA) television commercials were produced. Both PSA spots highlighted all the public transits in the OMEGA region and featured actual riders and transit drivers from the OMEGA region. The PSA spots were aired approximately 112 times on two regional television stations and received 52,972 streaming impressions over a period of several months. Recovery to Work Cohort Learning Academy

As a result of the COVID-19 pandemic, the state and nation have experienced both a rise in opioid use and a decline in workforce availability. As individuals in recovery search for employment, area agencies across the OMEGA region are partnering to participate in the Recovery to Work Cohort Learning Academy, under the Development District Association of Appalachia (DDAA), through funding from the Appalachian Regional Commission (ARC).

The Recovery to Work Cohort Learning Academy will strive to foster and curate partnerships between area businesses, recovery service providers and individuals in recovery from substance abuse disorders (SUD) who are ready to enter the workforce. The program is designed to coordinate Recovery to Work Efforts in the OMEGA Region, increase the number of employers that hire, support, and retain individuals in recovery, and to provide support services (transportation, housing, childcare) to program participants.

Core Team members include OMEGA, Coleman Health Services, The Columbiana County Port Authority, and Belmont College. Home Team members represent the Jefferson County Prevention and Recovery Board, the Urban Mission, the Area 16 Workforce Board, Kno-Ho-Co-Ashland CAC, Ohio Guidestone, Muskingum Behavioral Health, Guernsey Health Choices and Coshocton County Common Pleas Court. Alan Knapp, ARC Program Manager, is leading this effort.

Muskingum University Building Healthcare Pathways in Rural Appalachia Ohio

In October 2021, Muskingum University was awarded a \$970,227 grant from Workforce Opportunity for Rural Communities (WORC III) through the US Department of Labor for the grant project, Building Healthcare Pathways in Rural Appalachia Ohio. Grant funds will be used by Muskingum University and partners to train up to 900 new healthcare professionals and upskill existing healthcare professionals to improve their employability and earnings. The university is partnering with the hospitals in the service area, including Southeast Ohio Regional Medical Center, Muskingum Valley Health Center and Genesis Healthcare System, which is constructing a new hospital in Coshocton, creating 300 new healthcare jobs. Educational partners including Mid-East Career and Technology Centers, Zane State College and Central Ohio Technical College, will create pathways for healthcare training. The grant project also includes other partners to enhance this program, including Muskingum County Ohio Means Jobs to help with job placement, Muskingum Behavioral Health to promote employment of persons recovering from Substance Use Disorder, and the Ohio Mid-East Governments Association to assist with grant administration. The program also complements the university's new Health and Wellness Center, which has received funding from the Ohio Governor's Office of Appalachia.

Golden Age Retreat Carroll County

Carroll County received \$1,011,200 in COVID 19 Response CDBG Target of Opportunity Program funds to complete upgrades to the HVAC system at the Carroll County Golden Age Retreat, a residential assisted living facility which can house up to 50 residents. The implementation of this project will deliver a long-term measure to ensure that residents of the Golden Age Retreat have consistent access to proper ventilation and that fresh air is regularly circulated; thereby minimizing the potential to spread COVID-19 and other viruses.



The project will replace an outdated radiant heat boiler system that provides no method for ventilating fresh air throughout the building. The county is using the funding to install new ductwork, interior natural gas work and other modifications and repairs to promote air filtration and bi-polar ionization to assist in cleaning the air being discharged into the building. The ductwork will provide heating and ventilation to common areas of the building, including the basement activities room, basement beauty shop, two first floor dining rooms, first floor kitchen, first floor hospital ward and breezeway and second floor multi-purpose room.

Trina Woodland, Community Development Specialist for OMEGA prepared the application and is currently administering the grant which is scheduled for completion in late 2022.

Revolving Loan Fund

In 2021, the OMEGA Revolving Loan Fund Program approved and closed its largest loan in the history of the program for \$550,000 to Mountaineer Products, Inc., a multi-modal transloading company located in Bellaire, Ohio for the acquisition of adjacent properties for the expansion of their business capabilities. OMEGA also successfully closed the two previously reported pending loans to OBM Productions LLC and Kurz-Kasch, Inc.. Currently we are in the process of closing the approved loan to Master Manifest Properties LLC for the purchase of Creative Learning Childcare Inc., a very successful Preschool and Daycare facility located in St. Clairsville, Ohio. In 2021, OMEGA successfully defederalized the traditional EDA RLF Program.


EDA Partnership Planning

During 2021, OMEGA assisted with the preparation of two major grant applications to the Economic Development Administration (EDA) ARPA Programs.

The Coshocton Collaborative was a major EDA Economic Adjustment Assistance ARPA application in 2021. OMEGA has assisted with the project beginning with both the procurement of architect and EDA application. The complete application was submitted on December 29, 2021. If approved, the Coshocton Collaborative would convert a dilapidated Main Street building into a useful business incubator, maker space, and co-working space. The total project cost is \$3,899,814 with an EDA funding request of \$3,009,814. Additional project contributions include \$690,000 from JobsOhio and \$200,000 from the Coshocton County Commissioners.

The Wilds EDA Travel, Tourism, Outdoor Recreation Grant Under ARPA

OMEGA assisted the Wilds in applying for a \$2,155,616 grant from the Economic Development Administration (EDA) ARPA Tourism Grant Program for a total \$2,855,616 project. Funds will be used to construct water and sanitary sewer facilities to serve the proposed 75-unit Recreational Vehicle Campground at the Wilds, to increase visitors to the area and create and retain jobs and businesses in the regional hospitality industry.

EDA CARES Act Planning Grant

OMEGA Broadband Feasibility Study

After the COVID-19 pandemic exacerbated the digital hardship of access to broad-band, OMEGA utilized EDA CARES ACT funding to conduct a Broadband Feasibility Study through Reid Consulting Group. This ongoing project will allow areas with little to no broad-band access to be identified accurately and will identify short and long-term solutions to extend broadband to unserved and under-served areas. In 2021, OMEGA retained the Reid Consulting Group to conduct its ongoing Broadband Feasibility Study. Tom Reid and his team have been working diligently alongside OMEGA to develop broadband profiles for each county across the region. These profiles are able to depict which areas in each county do not have adequate access to broadband and includes download speeds common to each area. The profiles were developed using Ookla data and speed test survey results from residents. County level meetings were held in which local elected officials were able to review broadband profiles, ask questions, and provide input. Tom Reid was able to serve as guest speaker for the June 2021 OMEGA Executive Board Meeting, held in Steubenville. Reid took the opportunity to present his most current findings and outline a path forward for broadband access in the OMEGA region. OMEGA also worked with Buckeye Hills Regional Council and the Ohio Valley Regional Development Council to develop Connecting Appalachia. This study is to be completed in June 2022.

EDA CARES Act Planning Grant

OMEGA Economic Recovery Coordinator

OMEGA retained the Montrose Group as its Economic Recovery Coordinator in 2021. The Montrose Group organized and facilitated two meetings with the Guernsey County Strategic Plan Committee to develop the Economic Development portion of the Strategic Plan. The Montrose Group also facilitated separate meetings with the Strasburg and the Franklin Township JEDD to discuss expansion and development plans. They also assisted in advising the groups regarding best practices.

In Tuscarawas County, The Montrose Group developed the Property Card for the Tuscarawas Regional Technology Park after research and discussion with the Tuscarawas EDC regarding the goals and vision for the park.





Based on discussions with Local Economic Development Officials (LEDOs) in Holmes County, The Montrose Group developed the Holmes County Industrial Survey for the county to distribute, analyzed and summarized responses, and brainstormed with the group on how best to achieve the goals identified by the survey.

Based on the needs identified by the counties, The Montrose Group prepared Business Retention and Expansion Strategies for Carroll and Columbiana Counties that the counties have been able to implement into their economic development activities.

Utilizing their extensive network gained through the combined 70+ years of private and public economic development experience, The Montrose Group has connected several LEDOs with potential developers for industrial sites and spec buildings. The Montrose Group also has experience with applying for Rural Industrial Park Loan (RIPL) funds that can help LEDOs put together the best capital stack for industrial development.

Appalachian Regional Commission and Governor's Office of Appalachia

OMEGA secured **\$2.26 M** in federal and state ARC and GOA funding for communities in the region. These funds leveraged **\$26.6 M** in other funding sources.
